This will be the last newsletter of 2006. Let me wish you all a very relaxed Christmas and safe New Year on behalf of the Rhodesian Services Association committee.

October 2006 RV

Just to let the newer readers of this newsletter know the background to this event I will explain:- The October RV was first held as a one off event in 2002 to recognise and honour Rhodesian soldiers. It was held at the 6th Battalion (Hauraki) Regiment HQ in Tauranga, New Zealand. The C.O., Lt Col John Dick was so impressed with the spirit of the event that he said that we could make a display of Rhodesian military history as part of the Hauraki Regiment's history room. The RV was such a success that it was decided to hold it again the following year.

The display was constructed and it was officially opened by Lt Gen Peter Walls in April 2003. The ensuing RVs were all very successful. A feature of the event from 2003 was the auction which was held to raise funds for the development of the museum display. Keith Kietzmann was the auctioneer and his quick humour raised many thousands of dollars from donated goods over the years. In 2005 the RV was changed to coincide with the 11th November. This was a one off. In 2006 the event reverted back to the Labour Weekend holiday in October affording people an extra day for travel etc.

In 2006 preparations had been taking place in the background for many months. A lot of work goes into each RV and many people are involved. One of the most strenuous jobs is the catering which is managed by my wife Diana. Diana keeps it all within a tight budget, which together with the generous donation of meat by Percy and Yvonne Purcell, ensures that we can keep the ticket price so low. This year's adult ticket price of \$25 also included, for the first time, a Lion & Tusk lapel pin with the year 2006 on as keep-sake.

We kicked off on Friday 20th October 2006 when people started to gather at the Garrison Club in the afternoon. That evening we ran a selection of movies. We kicked off with a 5 minute sound track from Green Leader. We then showed a DVD kindly supplied by Msasa Productions www.rhodesianvideos.mazoe.com entitled Face of Rhodesia. It was an RTV production from around 1974/5 with footage of the Salisbury Show and other material bringing back some memories. We then ran a video of rafting on the Zambezi, the recent Kevin Woods interview and finished off with a short piece of humour. A good turnout and everyone enjoyed themselves.

On Saturday morning the keen golfers, under direction of Greg O'Carroll, took to a local course. As a non golfer I am not fully understanding of the terminology but I believe that some played 'more golf' than others. As you can see from the photo the event was dominated in numbers by the SAS and RLI. Barry Morgan and Steve Kennedy made sure the RLI took the honours at both ends of the field. Rhodesian Archives in the UK

Many of you will have seen the reports last month regarding the 423,000 pound grant to the University of West England to research and catalogue the archives of the Rhodesian Army. While we all acknowledge the need for this work to be done many people have voiced their concern as to what point scoring is to be done in the process.

Project leader Dr Diana Jeater is quoted as saying "For forty years, the wars of liberation in southern Africa had a profound impact on the region. Amongst those opposing African majority rule, the Rhodesian Army has been mythologised as a formidable fighting machine. This archive offers for the first time an opportunity to test the folklore surrounding this force, and to situate it in its time and place."

Let us hope that truth and fact prevails.
